

### **OUR PROTOCOLS**

In 2003, a Partner Abuse Protocol was developed by the Coordinating Committee Against Domestic Assault on Women (CCADAOW) for service providers in the Kingston Frontenac region. The Sexual Assault Protocol was launched in 2008 by the Sexual Assault Emergency Protocol Committee.

Both now managed by KFACC, these documents have helped establish a coordinated community response to intimate partner and sexual violence.

They set out guidelines and best practices for providing services to victims, and facilitate strengthened communication and cooperation among service providers.
